

Opening Activities

Good morning/afternoon!

Blow, blow, blow, some bubbles. (form circles with thumbs and index finger)

Do the bubble hop. (hop on one foot) Jump so high, (jump up and down) (clap hands on "pop") Until they pop,

Then you have to stop! (hold out hands in "stop" position)

Ready to Listen (fingerplay)

Let your hands go clap, (clap hands) Let your fingers go snap, (snap fingers)

Let your lips go up and down, (open and close mouth)

But don't make a sound. (shake head)

Fold your hands and close your eyes, (fold hands, then close eyes) Take a breath and softly sign. (inhale deeply then exile)

Sometimes my Hands (fingerplay)

(Match actions with words.)
